

## Endangered Whooping Cranes on the Texas Coast

### Expedition Packing List

#### GENERAL

- Expedition Logistics Document
- Your travel plans, rendezvous details, and Earthwatch's emergency contact information
- Photocopies of your passport, flight itinerary, and credit cards in case the originals are lost or stolen; the copies should be packed separately from the original documents
- Passport and/or visa (*if necessary*)
- Certification of vaccination (*if necessary*)
- Documentation for travel by minors (*if necessary*)

#### CLOTHING/FOOTWEAR FOR FIELDWORK

- Please plan to dress in layers, as temperatures and conditions will be variable throughout the day. Please be aware that weather is variable, and you may only use some of your equipment and attire.
- Lightweight, long-sleeve shirts—to be worn for both sun and mosquito protection (*Required*)
- Short-sleeve shirts to be worn as a base layer (*Required*)
- Lightweight field pants—cotton-nylon blend hiking pants with zip-off legs work well (*Required*)
- Midweight non-cotton fleece or sweater for warmth over the base layer (*Recommended*)
- A midweight jacket that offers wind protection and warmth. (*Required*)
- Do not bring jeans (they do not dry quickly) and yoga/sweatpants (mosquitoes can bite through them). **They are not acceptable** for fieldwork.
- Wide-brimmed hat for sun protection (*Required*)
- A comfortable pair of sneakers/tennis shoes (hard-soled and closed-toe) are best for fieldwork. They provide good support and traction in the muddy coastal marsh research sites and can easily be removed when fieldwork is completed. Hard-soled, tightly fitted dive booties may also be worn (*Required*)
- Socks to be worn in the field—will get wet and muddy (*Required*)
- Mid-calf or higher rubber boots are unacceptable **for fieldwork** as they can be over-top with water (leaving volunteers wet) or get stuck in the deeper mud at the research sites.
- Packable rain gear—for use on the boat (sea spray) and in the event of rain. These are also handy as a windbreak during cold fielding conditions (*Required*)
- Rubber sandals or Crocs are to be worn in the field. These are great for putting on when feet are wet and muddy at the end of the day.
- Pair of lightweight gloves and a toque for cold morning boat rides (*Required*)

#### CLOTHING/FOOTWEAR FOR LEISURE

- At least one set of clothing to keep clean for the end of the expedition.
- At least one set of clothing to wear outside in the evenings (*we recommend a long sleeve shirt and long pants for warmth and to prevent bites from mosquitoes*)
- Pair of light shoes or sandals

## FIELD SUPPLIES

- Reusable water bottle, wide-mouth Nalgene recommended (*Required*)
- Waterproof case for any cell phone or electronics you plan to take in the field—these items will get wet.
- Binoculars—we will be using binoculars throughout our time in the field. We recommend bringing your best pair (8x40 or higher magnification is preferred) to get a great view of the wildlife. (*Highly Recommended*)
- Walking poles for stability in the marshes.
- Small daypack or dry bag to keep your personal items together and dry when in the field (*Required*)
- Sunscreen lotion SPF 30+
- Flashlight with extra batteries and extra bulb
- Sunglasses
- Insect repellent (higher Deet concentration results in best mosquito production); (*Required*)

## BEDDING AND BATHING

Bed linens, blankets, pillows, and bath towels will all be provided.

## PERSONAL SUPPLIES

- Face masks—enough for the duration of the project
- COVID-19 antigen (rapid) tests
- Personal toiletries
- Hand sanitizer
- Personal first aid kit (e.g., anti-diarrhea pills, antibiotics, antiseptic, itch-relief, allergy meds, pain reliever, bandages, blister covers, etc.) and medications
- Personal medications or other necessities, enough to cover possible time beyond your planned travel days.
- Spending money

## OPTIONAL ITEMS

- Comfortable shoes to change into after conducting fieldwork
- Flip flops or sandals for the shower or to wear around the accommodation
- Scarf for time on the boat if you are sensitive to windy conditions (A high-zipping rain jacket can also suffice here)
- Camera, film or memory card(s), extra camera battery
- Hardware for sharing digital photographs at the end of the expedition
- Dry bag or plastic sealable bags (e.g., Ziploc) to protect equipment like cameras from dust, humidity, and water
- Books, games, art supplies, etc., for free time
- Earplugs for light sleepers

**Note:** *Bring only what you can carry and handle on your own.* If traveling by air and checking your luggage, we advise you to pack an extra set of field clothing and personal essentials in your carry-on bag in case your luggage is lost or delayed. *Please note laundry facilities will not be available during the expedition.*
